First Business Session

Annapolis, Maryland

1 (Called to order at 1405.)

2 NP HANDZUK: This meeting will now come  
3 to order. Was that loud enough, shipmates?

4 Shipmate Master at Arms, let the  
5 shipmates and any authorized guests in and close  
6 the door please.

7 MAA: Yes, sir. We may still have a few  
8 stragglers, sir.

9 NP HANDZUK: Very well. Shipmate  
10 National Chaplain, would you please open the  
11 Bible?

12 NCHAP BEHM: Shipmate National  
13 President, the Bible is open.

14 NP HANDZUK: Thank you, Shipmate  
15 National Chaplain. Cover.

16 Salute the colors. Hand salute. Two.

17 The first session of the 96th National  
18 Convention is now in session. Before we speak,  
19 just for informational purposes, if you wish to  
20 address the chair, as the Junior Past is about  
21 to, please go to the microphone, we are being

1 recorded. Shipmate at the mic.

2 JPNN ROBBINS: Shipmate National  
3 President, Junior Past is in the uniform of the  
4 day.

5 I request permission to come to the  
6 podium for a few minutes.

7 NP HANDZUK: Permission granted.

8 JPNN ROBBINS: On behalf of Dave Davis,  
9 who cannot be here because him and his wife are  
10 both in rough shape, I would like to present you  
11 with the gavel from Dave Davis, from Branch 290,  
12 and don't throw this at nobody, it's an oversized  
13 hockey puck. Dave made these by hand out of  
14 white cedar.

15 (Applause.)

16 NP HANDZUK: As a point of information,  
17 Dave Davis is a past regional president,  
18 southeast. There's a history behind his service  
19 to the FRA. He makes these gavels for the  
20 regional presidents of the FRA and auxiliary in  
21 the southeast region, and I think for a number of

1 years he's done it for the national presidents.  
2 And coincidentally, Shipmate Davis and I met in  
3 19, late 82. He relieved me as the planning and  
4 estimating officer on the USS Persimmony 8019. I  
5 was holding an officer's billet as a chief and he  
6 came aboard to relieve me when I went to go push  
7 recruits. So we go back a number of years, and I  
8 wish him and his bride Mary good health too.

9 Again, thank you, Shipmate Robby. Okay.

10 Shipmate NED, are you ready to call the  
11 role of officers?

12 NED REID: National President Handzuk?

13 NP HANDZUK: Present.

14 NED REID: National Vice President Behm?

15 NVP BEHM: Present.

16 NED REID: NED Reid, present.

17 Junior PNP Robbins?

18 JPNP ROBBINS: Here.

19 NED REID: Regional President

20 Northeast/New England Rizzo?

21 RPNENE RIZZO: Present.

1                   NED REID:   Regional President East Coast  
2   Oliveira?  
3                   RPEC OLIVEIRA:   Present.  
4                   NED REID:   Regional President Southeast  
5   Kirtley?  
6                   RPSE KIRTLEY:   Present.  
7                   NED REID:   Regional President North  
8   Central Blind?  
9                   RPNC BLIND:   Present.  
10                  NED REID:   Regional President South  
11   Central Smith?  
12                  RPSC SMITH:   Present.  
13                  NED REID:   Regional President Southwest  
14   Chapman?

1 NED REID: Shipmate National President,  
2 all officers are present and accounted for.

3 NP HANDZUK: Thank you, Shipmate NED.  
4 Right now at the moment I don't have a written  
5 script, I'm going by the standing Rule Number 3,  
6 but we are conducting this national convention in  
7 accordance with the constitution and bylaws.

8 A couple quick notes. When you approach  
9 the microphone to speak, you must identify  
10 yourself and your branch and whether you are a  
11 delegate, right?

12 Just as a point of information, if you  
13 are a visitor or a nonregistered delegate,  
14 according to the constitution and bylaws you do  
15 not have the privilege of the floor unless  
16 granted by the presiding officer, okay?

17 That said, I have a question. How many  
18 of you are first time national convention  
19 attendees, would you please stand?

20 (Applause.)

21 I wish to welcome you and hope that you

1 consider this, number one, a time for fellowship,  
2 getting to know your fellow shipmates, but just  
3 as importantly if not more so, a learning  
4 process. Irregardless of your age, you are  
5 essentially, if you will, new to the  
6 organization, and if you were at the opening  
7 ceremony this morning you saw introductions, you  
8 saw national officers, regional officers recycled  
9 multiple times serving the association. We need  
10 fresh leadership, not to say that the leadership  
11 that we have is stale, but getting tired. You're  
12 our future, and with that we need to build.  
13 Everybody else, offer a challenge, reach out to  
14 these new members who have chosen to attend this  
15 convention and encourage the to get engaged. If  
16 they ask you a question about the FRA, answer it,  
17 share your knowledge. That's what we did in the  
18 Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard, we didn't  
19 keep it to ourselves, okay?

20           This is something I've been very adamant  
21 about this year is sharing our experiences and

1 our knowledge. As I mentioned previously, I'm  
2 probably one of the oldest serving national  
3 presidents in the history of the FRA, but even as  
4 old as I am, I've always had a vision for the  
5 future, and I try to impart my knowledge and  
6 experiences with those who I've encountered. So  
7 that said, please make these new folks welcome  
8 and engage them, it's imperative for the future.  
9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 Shipmate Hatfield, are you prepared --

12 S/M HATCLIFF: Hatcliff.

13 NP HANDZUK: Hatcliff, I'm sorry. Are  
14 you prepared for the first credentials report?

15 S/M HATCLIFF: I am.

16 NP HANDZUK: Do you want to do it down  
17 there or up here?

18 S/M HATCLIFF: Right here.

19 NP HANDZUK: Very well.

20 S/M HATCLIFF: Shipmate National  
21 President, the first credentials report dated



1 November 12th, timed at 0900. The credentials  
2 worksheet is located in the delegate kit at  
3 Tab X.

4 Branches represented by delegates, 51.  
5 Votes represented by delegates, 431.

6 Branches represented by proxy, 78.  
7 Votes registered by proxy, 359.

8 Branches not registered, four.

9 Number of registered delegates, 107.  
10 Registered voting strength is 810. Votes not  
11 registered, 20.

12 The two-thirds voting strength is 541,  
13 and the majority vote is 406.

14 On behalf of the committee, I move that  
15 the role of the delegates hereby presented be the  
16 official role of the members of this convention.

17 NP HANDZUK: Would you please give us  
18 the voting strength for the convention?

19 S/M HATCLIFF: 810.

20 NP HANDZUK: 810, thank you. You made a  
21 motion to accept?

1 S/M HATCLIFF: Yes, sir.

2 NP HANDZUK: Is there a second?

3 S/M DURKIN: Durkin, Branch 91, second.

4 NP HANDZUK: Thank you. Any discussion?

5 Any questions?

6 S/M CUNNINGHAM: Cunningham, Branch 14.

7 It does not add up. It comes out to 790 for  
8 registered voters. Okay, I guess they're adding  
9 this; is that correct? Sorry.

10 NP HANDZUK: Are there any other  
11 questions regarding the convention credentials  
12 report? Go to the mic please, for the sake of  
13 the reporter and the delegates, thank you.

14 SPEAKER: The authorized voting strength  
15 according to Section 608 is 810. To get to that  
16 number you add the votes represented by  
17 delegates, the votes registered by proxy, and the  
18 votes not registered, adding up to 810.

19 NP HANDZUK: That's correct. Shipmate  
20 at the mic.

21 PRPSE RICHMOND: Shipmate Richmond,

1 delegate for Branch 22. Yeah, I think 810 is the  
2 authorized voting strength, but it should be 790,  
3 because the other -- that are registered,  
4 registered voting strength should be 790, because  
5 those other, how many were not registered, 20,  
6 they're not present. You take those 20 away from  
7 the 810 and you get the 790. Registered vote is  
8 790. Authorized vote, sure, is 810, but  
9 registered should be 790.

10 NP HANDZUK: I concur with that.

11 S/M HATCLIFF: I shall revise the report  
12 and do the revised credentials after the next  
13 break.

14 NP HANDZUK: We need to fix it so we can  
15 conduct business. All right. It's correct that  
16 the voting strength is 790 votes between those  
17 represented by delegates plus votes registered by  
18 proxy.

19 S/M HATCLIFF: Shipmate National  
20 President.

21 NP HANDZUK: Shipmate, go ahead.

1           S/M HATCLIFF: The corrected copy,  
2 branches represented by delegates, 51. Votes  
3 represented by delegates, 431. Branches  
4 represented by proxy, 78. Votes registered by  
5 proxy, 359. Branches not registered, four.  
6 Number of registered delegates, 107. Registered  
7 voting strength, 790. Votes not registered, 20.  
8 Two-thirds vote, 527. Majority vote, 396.

9           On behalf of the credentials committee,  
10 I move that the role of delegates be hereby  
11 submitted as the official role for the voting  
12 members of this convention.

13           NP HANDZUK: All right, I have a motion  
14 on the floor.

15           S/M DURKIN: Durkin, Branch 91,  
16 delegate, second.

17           NP HANDZUK: It's been moved and  
18 seconded to accept the corrected credentials  
19 report. On the question, discussion?

20           All those in favor, indicate by the sign  
21 of aye.

1 (Chorus of ayes.)

2 Opposed?

3 (No response.)

4 Motion carried.

5 Now, can you tell us the four branches  
6 not registered?

7 S/M HATCLIFF: Shipmate National  
8 President, no, not off the top of my head. My  
9 notes are in the office.

10 NP HANDZUK: All right, tomorrow's  
11 credentials.

12 S/M HATCLIFF: I can do that.

13 NP HANDZUK: Okay.

14 Okay, shipmates. In your convention  
15 program on page seven, lists a schedule, if you  
16 will. We're going to go through and get our  
17 committees established and then recess to begin  
18 deliberations for the remainder of the afternoon  
19 and tomorrow morning. Tomorrow, let me find it  
20 here, I think it's at 1300, MCPON will address us  
21 and we will assemble here at 1245 so we've got

1 everybody in the room.

2           Because we were delayed this morning,  
3 we're going to continue what I just said, to get  
4 the committees on their way so they can start  
5 deliberating for the remainder of the afternoon  
6 and tomorrow morning. After the MCPON speaks, we  
7 will take reports, starting with mine, NVP,  
8 et cetera, et cetera, and just move through. If  
9 we stay focused and to the point, we can get  
10 through this in plenty of time, okay?

11           So, again, I apologize, I don't have a  
12 script with all the information I'm supposed to  
13 have. I'm going to go through my list of  
14 committees and chairmen. Americanism-Patriotism,  
15 the chairman is Jerry Lickteig.

16           PRPNC LICKTEIG: Present.

17           NP HANDZUK: Okay. Where are we  
18 supposed to meet?

19           PRPNC LICKTEIG: Shipmate National  
20 President, Lickteig, Branch 161, chairman A&P.  
21 We were supposed to be meeting tomorrow morning

1 in the windward room to go through the report  
2 from the regional conventions. In Tab I in the  
3 delegate kit, I have the report that I had to  
4 submit up to national.

5 NP HANDZUK: So all your grading is  
6 done?

7 PRPNC LICKTEIG: The grading is, my  
8 report in Tab I is primarily based on the  
9 Americanism-Patriotism essay. We will be getting  
10 together to review groups one, two, three, four  
11 and five for the Americanism-Patriotism's report.  
12 That's going to have a list of the best reports  
13 in, number of flags sold, number of hours spent,  
14 that will be tabulated during our meeting.

15 NP HANDZUK: Okay. PNP Janksy, you were  
16 next.

17 PNP JANSKY: Shipmate National  
18 President, Jansky, delegate, Branch 31. Please  
19 understand that a lot of the committees are  
20 supposed to be meeting in the lower level which,  
21 the VA clinic is in those rooms currently. So

1 they could, if you're going to stop this meeting,  
2 they could use this room.

3 NP HANDZUK: That's correct. Shipmate  
4 at the mic.

5 S/M COMBS: Combs, delegate, Branch 161,  
6 Shipmate National President, I believe the  
7 procedure is to receive the reports of all of the  
8 officers and the committee chairmen.

9 NP HANDZUK: And Shipmate Combs, I  
10 indicated without having a proper script, I'm  
11 flying by the seat of my pants, okay? Have a  
12 seat. Okay.

13 Budget, finance and audit? Junior Past  
14 -- excuse me. Shipmate at the mic.

15 S/M HUNT: My name is Floyd Hunt from  
16 Branch 214, and I usually do our public relations  
17 report. If you open your book their, they left  
18 it out.

19 NP HANDZUK: We're going to fix that.

20 S/M HUNT: Okay, thank you.

21 NP HANDZUK: In fact, I believe it may



1 have already been fixed. When we get to that  
2 committee, we'll tell you where we're going to  
3 be.

4 Shipmate Junior Past.

5 JPNP ROBBINS: You called on me.

6 NP HANDZUK: I'm calling on you now, I  
7 know it's in the book. Just for everyone's  
8 education, at what time?

9 (Inaudibly off microphone discussion.)

10 NED REID: All of these committees are  
11 identified in the program, and the times and  
12 locations.

13 NP HANDZUK: Well, one committee has  
14 pointed out it was not listed in the schedule, is  
15 public relations, and that's Chairman National  
16 Chaplain Behm, Robert. Is he here?

17 NCHAP BEHM: Yeah.

18 NP HANDZUK: What time do you want to  
19 meet, when? Your call.

20 NCHAP BEHM: Tomorrow morning at  
21 nine o'clock.

1 NP HANDZUK: Okay. PR tomorrow morning  
2 0900, right here.

3 PRPSE RICHMOND: Shipmate National  
4 President.

5 NP HANDZUK: Shipmate at the mic.

6 PRPSE RICHMOND: Since we're doing this  
7 today, we can break off. Hospital, welfare,  
8 rehabilitation, if you are on my committee,  
9 please raise your hand. Okay. We'll do ours as  
10 soon as he breaks us up, we will grab a table  
11 right over there in the corner, and we'll go over  
12 HWR and have it done today, because I have to be  
13 at the budget and finance meeting tomorrow  
14 morning.

15 PNP LAZZARETTI: Shipmate National  
16 President.

17 NP HANDZUK: Shipmate at the mic.

18 PNP LAZZARETTI: Lazzaretti, Branch 18.  
19 There is one committee missing from the book and  
20 that's time and place. Is that going to happen  
21 this convention at all?

1 NP HANDZUK: Do you think?

2 PNP LAZZARETTI: I would hope so.

3 NP HANDZUK: Of course it is. We don't  
4 have a time and place committee, I have to  
5 appoint one, if no volunteers step up.

6 PNP LAZZARETTI: Shipmate National  
7 President, I volunteer. With my experience  
8 running two conventions, I am more than happy to  
9 sit and conduct the time and place meeting if  
10 there are proposals for conventions in future  
11 years.

12 NP HANDZUK: There are none that I'm  
13 aware of. Okay. Let me get through the  
14 microphone, and I will get back to time and  
15 place. Shipmate at the mic.

16 S/M FOGEL: Fogel, Branch 294, youth  
17 activities. We'll be having our meeting for the  
18 youth activities over at the far table over  
19 there, so we'll be meeting over there, all those  
20 on that committee. Thank you.

21 NP HANDZUK: Thank you. Shipmate at the

1 mic.

2 JPNNP ROBBINS: Junior Past Robbins, 126,  
3 delegate. Budget and finance, nine o'clock in  
4 the cocoa west room, which is downstairs, okay?  
5 Until we get done. It should have been noon, but  
6 until we get done.

7 NP HANDZUK: It is what it is, until  
8 they're done. Shipmate at the mic.

9 PRPNC LICKTEIG: Shipmate President,  
10 Lickteig, Branch 161, chairman of the A&P  
11 committee. I know I have a couple of regions  
12 that was going to be bringing in their first  
13 place winners for groups one to five. I know  
14 some of you mailed them to me. Those of you who  
15 have hand carried them, I need to get them. And  
16 as far as the people on the committee, we are  
17 going to meet back in that corner. Thank you.

18 NP HANDZUK: Thank you. Shipmate at the  
19 mic.

20 PRPNC POSEKANY: Shipmate National  
21 President, Posekany, delegate, Branch 12. Thank

1 you, Shipmate Richmond, for the holding the HWR  
2 today. That will constitution and bylaws two  
3 hours tomorrow morning from eight o'clock on  
4 ten o'clock in the stateroom downstairs. I know  
5 there's a lot of people that want to attend that  
6 because they have issues, so I would like to keep  
7 that at that same time. That gives us two hours  
8 in that room and we should be able to finish our  
9 business at that time.

10 Constitution and bylaws, 0800 in the  
11 stateroom on the lower level.

12 NP HANDZUK: Very well, thank you.

13 Okay, shipmates, as indicated, there is no time  
14 and place standing committee. Shipmate  
15 Lazzaretti has volunteered to serve on it. We  
16 typically by the constitution, are required by  
17 the constitution to plan two years out. We  
18 should have already had one for 26 but we don't.  
19 The only thing we have is through 2025.

20 Now that said, I need some volunteers to  
21 work with Shipmate Lazzaretti to start working on

1 planning something somewhere for 2026. So  
2 anybody willing to step up before I have to start  
3 picking people?

4 S/M (Inaudible): (Inaudible, Branch 24.

5 NP HANDZUK: Okay. Make sure you get  
6 with Shipmate Lazzaretti. Thank you, shipmate.

7 (Inaudible response from floor.)

8 NP HANDZUK: Okay. Could I get a couple  
9 more please? Anybody? Chuck? Thank you,  
10 shipmate. One more.

11 JPNP ROBBINS: Shipmate National  
12 President, Junior Past Robbins, delegate, 126.  
13 Don't forget, you have to have two auxiliary  
14 members on that committee.

15 NP HANDZUK: Thank you. I will get that  
16 message over there. Could I get one more  
17 delegate please? Donna, God bless you. Thank  
18 you.

19 Okay. When we recess, Shipmate Junior  
20 Past, will you please approach the auxiliary and  
21 get two volunteers for time and place?

1 JPNP ROBBINS: Yes.

2 NP HANDZUK: Thank you. Shipmate at the  
3 mic.

4 S/M HARDEN: Shipmate National  
5 President, Harden, delegate, chairman, VSO  
6 committee. We will meet in the coastal east  
7 room, 0830 to 1100. And I don't care what the  
8 thing says, this is what the agenda says, 0830.

9 S/M ANGEL: Shipmate National President.

10 NP HANDZUK: Shipmate at the mic.

11 S/M ANGEL: Angel, delegate, Branch 182,  
12 chairman of the hospitality. May I speak on that  
13 right now?

14 NP HANDZUK: Please.

15 S/M ANGEL: Okay. I'm sorry I'm late,  
16 shipmates. I just restocked the bar, we're on  
17 ice right now. We've got plenty of apple and  
18 plain, and we've got some good stuff. As soon as  
19 we are able, I will be open for two hours, from  
20 1700 -- I mean from -- yeah, 1700 to 1900, the  
21 hospitality room will be open. I will close when

1 we go to the reception. At 2200 I will reopen  
2 for one hour. If we get a number of people up  
3 there, I will stay open as long as you can, okay?  
4 2200, I will reopen. Any questions for me?  
5 Thank you, Shipmate National President.

6 NP HANDZUK: You're welcome, shipmate.

7 SPEAKER: Tell us the rooms.

8 S/M ANGEL: The hospitality rooms are  
9 360, 361, 362, tower two, over here. No, over  
10 here. As soon as you go up to the third floor,  
11 make a left and it's right in front of you. See  
12 everybody there.

13 (Applause.)

14 S/M HATCLIFF: Shipmate National  
15 President.

16 NP HANDZUK: Shipmate at the mic.

17 S/M HATCLIFF: Hatcliff, Branch 49,  
18 chairman of the credentials committee. As soon  
19 as we break this meeting, I will entertain any  
20 late registrations over there in front of the FRA  
21 office.



1 NP HANDZUK: Thank you. Shipmate at the  
2 mic.

3 SPEAKER: (Inaudible), delegate. We  
4 still have 19 meal tickets that have not been  
5 picked up, 19.

6 NP HANDZUK: All right. If you haven't  
7 got your meal tickets, better get them. No  
8 tickee, no washee. Do you have any announcements  
9 on the convention, et cetera? Shipmate at the  
10 mic.

11 PRPSC TALBOT: Talbot, Branch 159,  
12 planning committee chair. The planning committee  
13 has concluded its business for the year, so we  
14 will meet tomorrow at ten at that table for  
15 everybody that's available because as you've  
16 already seen, many of us are on other committees  
17 and conflicts, so our first idea may be to  
18 organize a schedule for the convention.

19 (Laughter.)

20 Our members are around here so Roger  
21 Christopher and Marcia Cunningham, stand up.

1 Richard DeHaven is not here. Rogelio Bacud,  
2 stand up. Abe Zino is not here. James Richmond,  
3 Charles McIntyre, please stand up. Robert  
4 Washington is not here, and Christina, who you  
5 all know. If you have any ideas going forward  
6 for the future, please share them, and I'll take  
7 them in and we will center on them around the  
8 year. So this is really your committee, we just  
9 represent you, and there's a representative from  
10 each region. We don't want to do this in a  
11 vacuum, we want to do this across the board.

12 NP HANDZUK: Thank you.

13 PRPSC TALBOT: Ten o'clock back there,  
14 those of us that are here.

15 PNP JANSKY: Shipmate National  
16 President.

17 NP HANDZUK: Shipmate at the mic.

18 PNP JANSKY: The welcome aboard tonight  
19 is in the coastal rooms on the lower level.

20 Please enjoy yourselves tonight, you need to have  
21 that password that is on your ticket in order to

1 get in. Also, please remember, we do have a tour  
2 tomorrow night, there are seats available. That  
3 tour is going on. I still haven't run into  
4 Mr. Somebody, but he is going around telling  
5 everybody that it's not.

6 (Inaudible conversations on floor.)

7 NP HANDZUK: Shipmate National Chaplain,  
8 would you close the Bible?

9 NCHAP BEHM: Shipmate National  
10 President, the Bible is closed.

11 NP HANDZUK: Thank you, Shipmate  
12 National Chaplain.

13 Salute the colors.

14 MAA: Hand salute. Ready, two.

15 NP HANDZUK: We stand in recess until  
16 1245 tomorrow afternoon.

17 (The first business session adjourned at  
18 1448.)
