

## A View From The Bridge

THANK YOU FOR ELECTING me FRA National President. Your confidence in my leadership is appreciated. As I start my tenure, I would like to share with you my views and priorities for the 2008-2009 Association year.

The 81st FRA National Convention in Branson, Mo., was a tremendous success. It was great to see the energy and enthusiasm shipmates have for FRA. At a pre-convention "Focus on the Future" session more than 50 shipmates heard from a panel consisting of MCPON Duane Bushey, SgtMaj Gene Overstreet, MCPOCG Rick Trent and MCPO Mike Baker about the changing needs and perspectives of today's active duty and reserve forces. That led to a lively discussion of important topics, which were revisited many times throughout the week and will be the subject of my conversations during my travels this year. We are a vital organization and must focus on our relevance for all enlisted Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard personnel, whether they be active duty, reserve, retired or veterans. Our legislative agenda reaches them all, and so must our recruiting and retention efforts.

The underlying discussion point is this: Recruiting is more of a process than handing over an application. There are many reasons to appreciate membership in FRA. Helping individuals recognize those reasons requires communication and hitting points which are of interest to them. Assure that you understand and reference FRA's value and importance to prospective members when recruiting. Don't be discouraged if the person doesn't know about FRA, but look at that as an opportunity to educate and connect what they need to what we offer.

Using that same principle, remind current members of the need to maintain their membership. This is not only for their own personal benefit, but also to benefit the entire membership. The larger we are, the more loudly we are heard as we lobby for pay, benefits and quality-of-life issues on Capitol Hill.

An important point was reiterated numerous times throughout Convention. Shipmates like to be involved. Some appreciate the opportunity to volunteer at an event; others like to make phone calls. Letting a prospective member see that there will be opportunities for involvement and leadership can be a great draw, and matching the desire with the need is critically important. What does your branch have to offer someone who would like to help?

Be aware that community service is an important aspect of association work. Any opportunity for outreach whether it is sponsoring a bowling league or hosting a table at a Veterans' Day event — is a valuable chance to leave a positive and lasting impression of FRA. Make it a team approach with organization, staffing, promotion and reporting back to the branch and region what happened. Headquarters has provided many tools online to assist branches in publicity efforts. Please call Eileen Murphy at 1-800-FRA-1924 (ext. 127) for an overview of what's available.

"Operation Red, White & Blue" is another great example of FRA's commitment to the country by expanding ownership and display of United States Flags as a symbol of patriotism and support for our troops. Additionally, branches can sell these flags for a profit and that money supports the Association's annual Americanism-Patriotism Essay Contest. Discussing this program with current and prospective members increases

awareness of FRA's credo of loyalty, protection and service. To get information on this program, call FRA National Headquarters at 1-800-FRA-1924.

Finally, never miss an opportunity to talk to your shipmates. The "Bring 'em Back" program was designed to help reinstate shipmates whose membership has lapsed. It's effective and I would like to see every branch using this program. Call lists can be made simply online in the Area For Branch and Regional Officers and scripts are available to get you started.

It is perhaps even more important for branches to be proactive. Reach out to your members before they lapse — keep them connected to the branch and listen to them. Hear them when they make suggestions about how to maximize their membership benefit. If you have a branch member who enjoys making phone calls, please get them involved in a routine of reaching out to shipmates. Branches who talk to every member at least once a month have great retention rates!

We can — and will — grow if you take pride in your association and show leadership. If you are interested in starting a new branch, call FRA's Director of Membership Development Penny Collins at 1-800-FRA-1924 (ext. 123).

#### Post 9/11 GI Bill

I agree with the elimination of the \$1,200 MGIB enrollment fee [in the new Post-9/11 GI Bill]. This should never have been included. All veterans deserve a GI Bill and too many didn't participate because of the enrollment fee.

I disagree with the provision that would pay the equivalent of tuition at an in-state university. States should



provide free tuition to veterans who enlist in their state. Illinois has been doing this for years and their veterans have a lifetime to use it.

I also disagree with the monthly stipend of \$1,000 for books. Many veterans were paid thousands of dollars to enlist. Their active duty pay was much better compared to civilian pay than it was for us Vietnam veterans. Veterans who go to school under the GI Bill should get a reasonable monthly amount, but \$1,000 a month? I don't think so. They need to be working some kind of job while attending school, which is good for them.

The new GI Bill is too expensive for our country, which is deeply in debt. I have always thought we should have a draft, eliminate enlistment bonuses and provide a free and reasonable GI Bill for honorably discharged veterans. From my experience as a state veterans' employment representative, I found it easier to find jobs for veterans because of their military dependability and experience.



#### SBP Refund

MCPO Wehle (September FRA Today, Shipmate Forum) is concerned about the beginning date of 30-year paid-up SBP and rightly so. It should be figured to the exact month of 360 payments.

However, of greater financial significance is the millions of dollars withheld from retirees (approximately 375,000) who have been paying into SBP since



its inception (October 1972) which is 36 years/432 months and into RSFPP (which merged seamlessly with SBP). [These payments] should also be counted in the paid-up

[computation]. In my case, since retirement in May 1969, I have paid for 39 years and 4 months which is 516 months instead of the presently required 360 months.

This is blatant robbery of retirees who honorably served for at least 20 years and upon retirement expected fair treatment from their government. There certainly should be a congressional provision made to reimburse all those retirees who have paid out more than 360 payments, rather than absorb those millions of dollars into the general fund.

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# Abridged Process Results in Passage of Defense Authorization Bill

**IN THE MILITARY, IT'S** often said you have to "hurry-up and wait." This year's abbreviated legislative calendar for both authorization and spending legislation (see story below on spending bill) reflected a "wait and hurry-up" approach as Congress passed substantial, complex legislation in the closing days of the session. And the hurried process, related in part to election-year posturing on Capitol Hill, impacted the final product.

Although the House passed its version of the FY2009 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA, H.R. 5658) in May, the Senate version (S. 3001) languished for months. When the Senate finally passed its version of the bill, language that would continue the prohibition on increasing TRICARE fees and pharmacy co-pays was not included, even though the Senate Armed Services Committee voted to extend these prohibitions. The provision was added later, but in the rush to pass the Senate measure before adjournment, several hundred other floor amendments were skipped to speed up passage — several of which were supported by FRA.

The House and Senate passed the hastily-conferenced legislation in the final days of the regular session for the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress, and President Bush signed it into law on 14 October 2008. The final measure prohibits TRICARE fee increases and pharmacy co-pay increases for one year, authorizes a larger-than-requested pay increase of 3.9 percent, creates a pilot program of preventative care for TRICARE beneficiaries under age 65 and eliminates co-pays for certain preventative services, mandates recalculation of TRICARE Reserve Select (TRS) premiums to reflect actual costs, and increases Marine Corps end strength. The measure also includes language that authorizes veterans to salute the flag during the National Anthem when not in uniform.

Amendments to improve concurrent receipt for Combat Related Special Compensation (CRSC) and Concurrent Retirement and Disability Payments (CRDP), allow for early retirement for Reservists mobilized since 9/11/01, streamline military overseas voting, and eliminate the SBP/DIC were not included the final bill.

#### FY2009 DoD, VA, and DHS Appropriations Enacted

The House and Senate approved legislation (H.R. 2638) that funds programs in the Departments of Defense (DoD), Veterans Affairs (VA), and Homeland Security for FY2009 and authorizes a Continuing Resolution (CR) for the remainder of the federal government until 6 March 2009. The President signed the bill into law on 1 October making it the first time in more than 10 years that the VA and DoD annual spending bills were enacted into law on time.

The DoD Appropriation is \$4 billion less than requested, but 6.2 percent more than FY2008 spending levels. Unfortunately in the rush to get the bill passed, the measure does not provide the extra funds to pay for the 3.9-percent pay increase provided in the authorizing bill (S. 3001). House Appropriations Committee staffers have indicated that DoD will have to reprogram that money (\$239 million) from other parts of the personnel

budget after the authorization measure is signed into law. Increased funding is also included for the Defense Health Program (DHP) in lieu of the Administration's requested TRICARE fee and pharmacy co-pay increases. The bill also includes funding for barracks, hospitals, and other facilities; military family daycare programs and dependents education; and a new program to pay service members for involuntary extensions to their military service.

The Military Construction, Veterans Affairs Appropriation (MilCon/VA) is five percent higher than requested and 14 percent more than FY2008. The measure provides increased funding for the Veterans Health Administration; an increased mileage reimbursement rate (41.5 cents per mile) for veterans traveling long distances to VA medical facilities; enrollment in the VA health care system for some Priority 8 veterans; and 2,000 additional claims



processors to reduce the claims backlog at the VA.

The Homeland Security portion of the bill includes \$9.36 billion in funding for the U.S. Coast Guard — \$290 million above the President's request and \$729 million more than the FY2008 appropriations. The measure also includes money to start construction on the new Homeland Security headquarters at the St. Elizabeth's Hospital site in Washington, D.C.

#### TRICARE ISSUES

#### More \$22 Co-pays for Some Medications

A DoD pharmacy panel has proposed moving certain blood glucose test strips, overactive bladder medications (Detrol and Trospium IR), an antidepressant drug (Pristiq) and a hypertension drug (Sular Geomatrix) to the third tier (\$22 co-pay level) from the \$9 co-pay level. The recommended formulary change will be submitted to Assistant Secretary of Defense (Health Affairs) for final resolution.

DoD will notify all beneficiaries currently taking these medications so they and their physicians can consider substitute medications available at the lower co-pay. Information on substitute medications can be found at: http://www.tricareformularysearch.org/. Doctors who believe it is imperative for a patient to take the third-tier medications can provide "medical necessity" justification to TRICARE. If approved, the beneficiary will continue receiving the medication at the lower co-pay.

#### TRICARE Retiree Dental Benefit Available Overseas

Retired TRICARE beneficiaries living overseas may enroll in the TRICARE Retiree Dental Program (TRDP). Effective 1 October 2008, the Enhanced-Overseas TRDP is available for eligible Uniformed Services retirees and their families.

Prior to this change, the TRDP was only available to retirees and their families in the United States, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands and Canada. The Enhanced-Overseas TRDP now allows retirees worldwide to purchase dental coverage.

Highlights of the benefits available under the Enhanced-Overseas program include:

- Immediate coverage upon effective enrollment date for all routine, preventive and emergency services, such as cleanings, exams, x-rays, fluoride treatments, fillings, oral surgery, periodontal treatment and root canals.
- Coverage for implant services, crowns, bridges, dentures and orthodontics after only a 12-month waiting period.
- Separate dental accident coverage is included.

Enhanced-Overseas TRDP enrollees who need to locate a dentist for covered services may call the International SOS Assistance, Inc. (I-SOS) 24-hour referral service toll-free at 800-523-6586 (from inside the U.S.) or via collect call to 215-942-8226 (outside of the U.S.). Indicate that Delta Dental is your dental coverage carrier. In addition, an online host-nation provider list of more than 500 dentists and dental clinics in nearly 50 countries is located on the TRDP website. Note that overseas dentists do not offer discounted dental services as do the participating TRDP dentists within the original service areas.

#### **TRICARE Offers Respite Care for Wounded Warrior Caregivers**

The FY2008 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) authorizes TRICARE to offer primary caregivers of Active Duty Service Members (ADSMs) much needed rest, relief and reprieve. TRICARE will now pay for up to eight hours of care, five days a week, for active-duty service members who are homebound and require frequent assistance from a caregiver.

ADSMs, or their legal representatives, can submit receipts for reimbursement of respite care services that were provided by a TRICARE-authorized Home Health Agency after 1 January 2008. For more information about this benefit visit the TRICARE website at http://www.tricare.mil.

#### More Documentation Necessary to Replace, Renew ID Cards

Homeland Security Directive 12 now requires retirees and family members seeking to renew or replace a military identification card to provide two types of ID, one of which must include a photo. The following types of identification are acceptable:

- Driver's license or ID issued by a state or outlying U.S. commonwealth or possession;
- ID card issued by federal, state or local government agencies or entities;
- School ID card with a photograph;
- Voter's registration card;
- U.S. military ID card;
- U.S. passport;
- Certificate of U.S. citizenship; or
- Certificate of naturalization.

The listing above is not all-encompassing. A complete list of acceptable documents can be found at http://www.uscis.gov/files/form/I-9.pdf, Page 4. It is also recommended that retirees and family members call ahead to verify what specific documents may be required. For contact information and the location of the nearest ID card issuing facility, visit http://www.dmdc.osd.mil/rsl/owa/home. On this website, people can search by city, state or ZIP code.

# President Expands Federal Job Opportunities for Military Spouses

President Bush issued an Executive Order to increase military spouse employment preferences for all federal agencies. The order includes hiring preferences for surviving spouses and spouses of wounded service members. The President recommended improvements to military spouse employment in his State of the Union address in January 2008. #### 2008 Defense Forum Assesses Wounded Warrior Care

RPEC Claire Purdy and FRA staff attended the one-day "Measuring Success: Keeping Faith with Wounded Warriors and Their Families" Defense Forum that examined progress on the care and rehabilitation of our wounded warriors and their families. Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman Senator Carl Levin (Mich.) and Veterans Affairs Secretary Dr. James B. Peake were among the speakers at the forum.

Key uniformed service and administration leaders, legislators, health care providers, wounded warriors and family members joined other concerned professionals to discuss subjects such as traumatic brain injury (TBI), post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and the progress to date on various pilot projects to improve programs and support for wounded warriors.

Recently enacted legislation established a comprehensive policy on the care and management of wounded service members in order to facilitate and enhance their care, rehabilitation, physical evaluation, transition from care by the Department of Defense (DoD) to the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), and transition from military service to civilian life. The measure was ultimately included in the FY2008 Defense Authorization Act. FRA continues to advocate for adequate funding and congressional oversight to ensure these programs are effectively implemented and sustained.

# New Resources for Ailing Service Members, Families and Caregivers

#### **WOUNDED WARRIORS**

DoD announced that the Military OneSource service has established a Wounded Warrior Resource Center. The center offers a telephone number and e-mail address for service members and their families who have concerns or other difficulties during their recovery process. Service members and their family members can now call 800-342-9647 or e-mail wwrc@militaryonesource.com 24/7 to request support. Assistance provided by the resource center will not replace the specialized wounded warrior programs established by each of the military services, but it will offer another avenue of assistance.

DoD also announced the release of its comprehensive handbook describing compensation and other benefits service members and their families would be entitled to upon separation or retirement as a result of serious injury or illness. Compiled in cooperation with the Departments of Veterans Affairs, Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education and the Social Security Administration, the handbook describes the disability eligibility process, various program qualifications, application procedures, and numerous resources with associated contact information. Web sites and toll-free numbers are provided, and the electronic version (available at http:turbotap.org) includes hyperlinks. The electronic version of the handbook will be updated frequently and the hard copy of the compensation and benefits handbook will be updated annually.

#### **CHEMICAL EXPOSURE**

The Department of Defense Force Health and Protection Readiness Directorate (FHP & R) launched the Chemical-Biological Warfare Exposures website (http://fhp.osd.mil/CBexposures) to provide service members, military retirees, veterans, their families and the public with information on testing of chemical and biological warfare agents from 1942 to 1975. Veterans or retirees who believe that they may have been exposed or who would like more information can contact DoD via email at CBWebmaster@tma.osd.mil or call DoD's contact manager at 800-497-6261, Monday through Friday, 7:30 AM to 4:00 PM (Eastern Time).

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has also set up a web page for chemical exposure at www1.va.gov/shad. Veterans who would like to talk to a VA representative can call the Special Issues Helpline at 800-749-8387.

#### **VA Makes ALS a Presumptive Compensable Illness**

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) announced that amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a degenerative nerve disease, will become a presumptively compensable illness for all veterans with 90 days or more of continuously active service in the military. The VA based this decision primarily on a November 2006 report by the National Academy of Sciences' Institute of Medicine (IOM) on the association between active-duty service and ALS, which showed that veterans develop ALS at a higher rate than the general population.

The new regulation applies to all applications for benefits received by VA on or after 23 September 2008, or that are pending before VA, the United States Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims, or the United States Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit on that date.

#### **VOTING ISSUES**

#### **Senate Passes Military Voting Protection Bill**

The Senate passed "The Military Voting Protection Act" (S. 3073) that requires that overseas military votes be delivered to state election officials by air transport. The measure, sponsored by Texas Senator John Cornyn and supported by FRA, was amended to require DoD to ensure prompt delivery to local election officials for any overseas military ballots received a week before the election. If enacted, the law will apply to the 2010 election.

FRA is concerned that less than half of overseas military voters who requested an absentee ballot actually had their votes counted in the 2006 election, according to a September 2007 report of the U.S. Election Assistance Commission. The Association's concerns are referenced in its legislative agenda and testimony before various congressional subcommittees.

FRA is also working with the Pew Center on the States in support of the Military and Overseas Citizen Voting Project, which addresses the complex process facing military and overseas citizens attempting to register and cast ballots in U.S. elections. The Association participated in the recent "Democracy at a Distance" Summit on Capitol Hill that focused on making it easier for military and overseas voters to cast their votes. NED Joe Barnes moderated a discussion panel on potential federal legislative strategies to address the challenges faced by military and overseas voters.

At the summit, the Pew Center on the States and the Overseas Vote Foundation launched a new online tool that allows military voters to complete the Federal Write-in Absentee Ballot (FWAB) more easily and with fewer errors. This online tool, available at www.overseasvotefoundation.org, can be used by overseas voters who have requested an absentee ballot from election officials but have not yet received it.

#### **VA Clarifies Voter Registration Regulations**

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) clarified its policy on assisting veterans' voter registration activities, with particular focus on inpatients and residents of VA community living centers, and patients with limited access to community voter registration resources. The VA will allow state and local election officials and non-partisan groups into its hospitals and outpatient clinics to assist VA officials in registering voters. Such assistance, however, must be coordinated by those facilities in order to avoid disruptions to patient care.

The policy requires that information about the right of VA patients to register and vote, and other patients' rights, be posted in every VA hospital, and that all patients be provided a copy of these rights when they are admitted to a VA facility. Each hospital is also required to publish a written policy on voter assistance, allowing patients to leave the hospital to register and vote, subject to the opinions of their health care providers. Patients unable to leave the facility must be assisted to register and vote by absentee ballot.

#### 2009 COLA Increase

The Bureau of Labor Statistics announced that the official 2009 Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) increase is 5.8 percent, payable in January, and is applicable to military retired pay, VA benefits for disabled veterans, survivor annuities, and Social Security benefits for next year. This is the largest increase since 1982 and is significantly larger than last year's 2.3-percent COLA increase and this year's 3.9-percent pay increase for active duty personnel.

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is used to calculate this annual COLA and is based on the cost of a "basket of goods" for the average American during the period from 1 October to 30 September of each year. Components in the "basket" include gasoline, electricity, food, housing, transportation, and medical care. When the CPI and associated COLA rates go up, it is an indication that consumers have been paying more for the same amount of goods and services.

#### **New Benefits Take Effect**

The "Paid-Up SBP" (Survivor Benefit Plan) law took effect 1 October 2008 for retirees who are at least 70 years old and have paid SBP premiums for at least 30 years (360 months). Retirees who meet these criteria will no longer have SBP premiums deducted from their retired pay, which will be reflected in November 2008 pay statements. According to the Defense Financing and Accounting Service (DFAS), premiums will stop automatically when a participating retiree meets both the age and payment criteria.

The Concurrent Retirement and Disability Pay (CRDP) phasein period was eliminated for retirees rated less-than-100-percent disabled, but receiving compensation at the 100-percent rate based on Individual Unemployability (IU). This change also became effective on 1 October 2008 and will be reflected in November 2008 pay statements. The CRDP improvements are retroactive to 1 January 2005, and any authorized retroactive payments will be sent separately as audits of individual retiree accounts are completed by DFAS.

These initiatives were strongly supported by FRA and the later was addressed as part of the FY2008 Defense Authorization Act.

## **CONVENTION COMMUNICATIONS**



#### **MISSION FIRST, SAILORS ALWAYS**

Vice Admiral Mark E. Ferguson III, Chief of Naval Personnel (CNP), was the keynote speaker at the joint opening ceremonies to kick off the FRA and LA FRA conventions. He thanked shipmates for their legacy of service, both in the military and in FRA, and expressed his appreciation for FRA's advocacy on behalf of military personnel and their families.

Ferguson provided an update on the Navy's personnel programs, including recruiting and retention statistics. "Nearly 40,000 exceptionally qualified" Sailors have taken the oath in Great Lakes so far this year and Navy retention rates began to increase in June and July, which Ferguson credits to a more focused workforce with a strong commitment to the Navy's core values. He referenced the Navy's status as a "Top 50 employer," which is evidence of the service's emphasis on deckplate leadership and its investment in people.

CNP Ferguson also spoke about the Navy's role in Iraq and Afghanistan, commending the nearly 70,000 Sailors who have been deployed in support of Operations Iraqi Freedom (OIF) and Enduring Freedom (OEF). Nearly half of the Navy fleet and over 14,000 Sailors on the ground in Irag, Afghanistan, Djibouti and the Horn of Africa are deployed on any given day, with Reserve component personnel fully integrated with the active duty force.

He also referenced three "tectonic shifts in the country" that affect the Navy's personnel structure. The first is a generational value shift in today's Navy. More than 43 percent are considered Millennials (born between 1980 and 2000), which Ferguson believes will be the "next great generation — a demographic segment that is optimistic, close to their parents, interdependent and feels a sense of connection to a cause greater than themselves." This shift impacts the way the Navy markets itself and requires the service to provide a life/work balance and the flexibility to offer up to a two-year sabbatical for active duty personnel.

The second demographic shift is the increased role of women in today's military. In 2008, 18 percent of newly-commissioned ensigns were female, and 28 percent of ROTC and 21 percent of Naval Academy commissions were awarded to women. "This is a talent base we cannot ignore" and impacts leave policy for births and adoptions, as well as the requirement for expanded child care options.

Diversity was the third shift that impacts the future of the Navy. Women and minorities make up nearly 70 percent of today's Navy.

Ferguson also thanked FRA for its important work to ensure Congress honors its commitment to military personnel. "Because you know the cost of freedom, because you understand how important it is to invest in a strong military force and its people and its families that can sustain the peace and win a war, your service continues today. [You are] the voice for our Sailors, Marines and Coast Guardsmen working with Congress, the Department of Defense and other departments and agencies to improve that quality of service, the benefits, and that covenant that we have with those young people that serve and have taken your place in the ranks of the military."

He assured shipmates that the Navy is getting stronger and better each day and thanked the Association for echoing the message on his challenge coin: Mission First, Sailors Always.

# DELEGATES DEBATE, DELIBERATE AND DELIVER DECISIONS

During FRA's 81st National Convention in Branson, Mo., delegates voted on a number of key initiatives that impact shipmates and the operation of the Association:

#### DUES INCREASE EFFECTIVE 1 JANUARY 2009

Delegates voted to increase annual membership dues to \$30 per year. New members may enjoy a 20-percent discount by paying \$48 for a two-year membership, with an annual renewal rate of \$30 thereafter. Renewing and reinstated members will receive a five-percent discount for a two-year (\$57) or a three-year (\$85.50) term. Those who are reinstated or renew for a five-year term will receive a 10-percent discount (\$135) on the total dues amount. A discount of six-percent (\$28.20 per year, \$2.35 per month) will apply to those who pay by allotment.

# Budget and Finance Committee Votes to Increase FRA Today Subscription Rates

At the Budget and Finance Committee meeting in August, the committee discussed the current *FRA Today* subscription rates and the significant increased cost of printing and mailing since the last rate adjustment. In accordance with the C&BL Article 10, Section 1002, the Committee unanimously voted to increase the non-member subscription rates as follows:

- Non-members \$35. (This group includes, for example: Individuals who are not members but are interested in FRA Today, foreign governments, libraries, subscription services, etc.)
- Non-widow members of the LA FRA \$10
- Widows of deceased Shipmates \$7
- Widows of FRA life members will continue to receive FRA Today at no cost.

The effective date is 1 Jan. 2009.

## Membership & Retention

FRA'S 81ST NATIONAL CONVENTION in Branson, Mo., was a great success and included the annual meeting of the Association's National Committee on Membership & Retention. Although the committee meets every other month via teleconference to keep abreast of pertinent issues, the convention gathering allows committee members to meet face-to-face as they discuss matters relating to membership: recruiting, retention, outreach, awareness and awards.

Recruiting new members is obviously important to the future of the FRA. By promoting the benefits of membership, you can demonstrate the value of joining the Association. The value proposition will be different for each individual, so it's helpful to listen to prospective members and learn what's important to them. Are they interested in the fellowship and camaraderie of fellow shipmates? Are they looking for ways to be involved in community service projects? Do they have a spouse, children or grandchildren who might benefit from FRA's scholarship program? Are they aware of FRA's outstanding legislative advocacy efforts for active duty, reserve, retired and veteran members of the Sea Services? The committee discussed a variety of way in which shipmates can bring these important messages to prospective members, including outreach events like Navy Fleet Week, Active Duty or Retiree Appreciation Days, and seminars for personnel transitioning to the civilian world such as Transitional Assistance Programs (TAP).

Retention is a challenge for some branches. The committee discussed the "Bring 'Em Back" call program, which is a simple and useful way to connect with branch members whose memberships are about to expire. People are more inclined to stay active if they hear directly that their participation is valued. The call program used at National Headquarters has been very successful in retaining Members-at-Large, with a 32-percent renewal rate in July 2008, for example. The committee recommends that branches set up a local call program to encourage members to keep their memberships up to date. A sample script is available and I encourage interested branches to contact me if they need assistance in setting up a "Bring 'Em Back" program.

Outreach is an awesome way to get the attention of prospective members. The committee discussed how well this concept works if members get involved. For example, Cheyenne (Wyo.) Branch 59 participated in their city's Frontier Days, which honored active duty Sailors. Branch members marched in parades, assisted with serving food to crew members from the USS Cheyenne (SSN-773) and USS Wyoming (SSBN-742), and escorted them to the local VA Medical Center Nursing Home so they could interact with senior veterans being treated there. Outreach opportunities such as this have led Branch 59 to have the highest percentage recruiting gain (15.56 percent) in the Association and earned them the Abraham M.



Special congratulations go to Shipmates Frank Misiura of Branch 103 (Yokosuka, Japan) and Charles Goodman II of Branch 276 (Omaha, Neb.) Misiura was named overall top recruiter for his work to recruit and/ or reinstate 46 FRA members during the past membership year. Goodman received the Frank J. McPherson Memorial Award, which is given to the shipmate who most effectively promotes membership development within his branch. Congratulations to all of our awardees.

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## **DELEGATES DEBATE, DELIBERATE** AND DELIVER DECISIONS

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#### CHANGES IN 85/25 MEMBERSHIPS

Prior to Convention, shipmates who reached the age of 85 and had maintained at least 25 years of continuous FRA membership were no longer required to pay membership dues. Convention delegates approved a change to Article 4. Section 401(m) of the Constitution and ByLaws (C&BL) that now authorizes the dues waiver only for shipmates who are 85 years old with 40 years of continuous membership. The change took effect at the close of Convention, but those who received a membership card indicating their 85/25 status will be grandfathered and will not be required to pay dues.

#### **NO CHANGE IN REGIONAL BOUNDARIES**

A resolution to restructure FRA's nine regions was ruled out of order and was not debated by delegates. As a result, the Association's regional structure (according to C&BL Article 11, Section 1101) remains unchanged.

#### FRA ESTABLISHES EDUCATION **FOUNDATION**

Delegates approved the establishment of a 501(c) 3 Education Foundation to administer the Association's scholarship program. The foundation will provide an avenue for shipmates and others to make tax-free donations to the scholarship program. As a 501(c)3 organization, the foundation will also be eligible to participate in the government's Combined Federal Campaign (CFC).

#### **RITUALS ARE GUIDELINES**

Eight resolutions were considered to amend FRA rituals. Because the FRA Rituals manual states that "individual branches may modify these Rituals to conform with local conditions," delegates voted against any formal changes.

### **CONVENTION PRESENTATIONS/WORKSHOPS**

#### **FOCUS ON THE FUTURE**

NED Barnes moderated a panel which included MCPON Duane Bushey, USN, (Ret.), SMMC Gene Overstreet, USMC (Ret.), MCPOCG Rick Trent, USCG (Ret.) and MCPO Mike Baker, USN (Ret.). Barnes provided an overview of membership challenges for FRA and other associations, staff goals and statistics specific to FRA. The panel followed with observations and insights about FRA. The panel reminded audience members that as the association membership average age rises, it is increasingly important to recruit younger shipmates to continue the vital work of the association. With that, they paid special attention to communicating with and relating to the active duty audience, understanding their needs and experiences are significantly different from those of previous generations. The panel took questions from audience members as well. The second half of the session was an open discussion for shipmates to share best-practices from their recruiting efforts and capture key points for further discussion in the coming year. These points shared by shipmates in attendance were: Identify FRA's unique value proposition for target audiences: veterans, retirees, active duty, Reserve and family members; Make the association more relevant to target groups; Enhance communications and awareness of the association; Maximize opportunities - promoting association programs to current and prospective members.

# MOTIVATING OTHERS TO ACT

SMMC Gene Overstreet also facilitated a motivational workshop focused on FRA's recruiting and retention efforts. No stranger to motivating others, Overstreet outlined the need to help prospective members understand the value of FRA membership. He suggested

using FRA Today as a key tool in explaining the Association's legislative and community outreach efforts, and encouraged shipmates to listen more closely to learn what's important to potential members. He challenged shipmates to recruit and train their replacements through strong leadership and personal ownership of the Association.

# WELLNESS AND NUTRITION

Maj. Karen Fauber, USAR, spoke to shipmates about the importance of a healthy diet in maintaining lifelong wellness. A licensed dietician for the Defense Commissary Agency (DeCA), Fauber advised shipmates and ladies to use the nutritional information on packaging labels to guide their grocery purchases. She advised shopping the outside aisles in the grocery store (which traditionally include fresh produce, meats, seafood and dairy items) to create more healthful meals. Her presentation included a video about nutrition for diabetes patients, but added that many of the video's recommendations also apply to the population at large.

Katy Venskus, director of operations for the Wisconsin Partnership to Fight Chronic Diseases, encouraged attendees to take preventative measures to improve their overall health and that of their families. Preventative care can provide not only a higher quality of life, but can also help reduce personal costs and alleviate the strain on America's healthcare system. The Partnership to Fight Chronic Disease advocates changing the healthcare system, too, by offering expanded access to dieticians and other providers that can help patients prevent more invasive, more expensive procedures like surgery and rehabilitation services. Improving healthcare is an economic issue and, although individuals can do little to make healthcare cheaper, they can make themselves healthier.

# LEGISLATIVE ISSUES UPDATE

NED Joe Barnes, Assistant Director of Legislative Programs Ed Dockery, National Veterans Service Officer Chris Slawinski, Outreach Manager Bob Washington, and Shipmate Dennis Egge facilitated a briefing on FRA's current advocacy efforts on Capitol Hill. Key initiatives being considered by Congress were highlighted, including authorization and appropriations bill for the Departments of Defense. Veterans Affairs and Homeland Security. Shipmate Egge (Honolulu Branch 46) provided an overview of the Uniformed Services Former Spouses Protection Act (USFSPA), a poorly-written law that often allows military retired pay to be unfairly divided in divorce proceedings.



#### **VA PROGRAMS**

Kevin Secor, special assistant to the Secretary of Veterans Affairs (VA), and Chris Slawinski, FRA's National Veterans Service Officer (VSO). gave an overview of the VA system that includes the Veterans Health Administration (VHA), Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) and National Cemeteries Administration (NCA). Secor discussed the new Post-9/11 GI Bill benefit, explaining that implementation is being outsourced because VA does not have the technical expertise to do so. Technology will also help VBA and VHA communicate more effectively to create better, faster results, and two new pilot programs are being implemented to expedite claims processing. An additional 3,100 adjusters are being hired to help reduce the 860,000 backlogged



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#### **CONVENTION SPEAKER RECAP**







#### SENIOR ENLISTED LEADERSHIP FORUM

Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON) Joseph Campa, Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps (SMMC) Carlton Kent, and Master Chief Petty Officer of the Coast Guard (MCPOCG) Skip Bowen led a discussion forum about the status and future of their respective services.

MCPON Campa credited the Navy's success to the commitment of today's Sailors and the care and concern of citizens and organizations like FRA. He highlighted the Navy's involvement in Iraq and Afghanistan, praising Sailors who are "working side-by-side with soldiers, often leading the way," supporting convoys, finding improvised explosive devices (IEDs), and aiding wounded warriors. He also spoke of the importance of caring for those who are wounded in service to our nation, including those whose wounds are not obvious at first glance. "These service members met their full responsibility to our country. We must meet our full responsibility to them," said Campa.

SMMC Kent echoed the need to care for wounded warriors, and praised the Marine Corps' Wounded Warrior Regiment for its superb efforts. The Commandant's policy is to retain all Marines who wish to stay in service, some are even going back to combat. "These Marines never complain, they only want to get back to their units," he said, following a moving story of a Marine who had lost both his legs in combat. He asked FRA to continue its efforts to ensure adequate funding to care for these heroes as well as maintain the authorized increase in the Corps' personnel endstrength.

MCPOCG Bowen thanked FRA for its support of the Coast Guard and its training and recognition programs. He also outlined his service's reorganization and Deepwater recapitalization efforts, including a pilot program to admit select Coast Guard personnel to the Navy's elite Special Forces program. Bowen also thanked FRA for its legislative advocacy to improve healthcare, housing, childcare and other quality-of-life programs for Coast Guard personnel and their families.

During the Question-and-Answer portion of the forum, the E-10s were asked to discuss their service's personnel challenges. MCPON Campa spoke about the Navy's manning strain resulting in the additional requirements for IAs (individual augmentees) for OIF and OEF missions. "We've developed technology to replace manpower, but the technology has not caught up to the Navy's manpower reductions." he said. SMMC Kent referenced the requirement to balance OIF and OEF requirements. the need to provide additional barracks and work areas to accommodate the Corps' manpower growth, and the challenge of healthcare access as his service's most significant personnel challenges. MCPOCG Bowen also expressed concern about healthcare access, particularly for USCG personnel stationed in remote, high-cost areas.

All three senior enlisted leaders thanked FRA for raising awareness of their services' need for adequate funding and also for the Association's role in maintaining and preserving the services' traditions and values.



#### **FORCM** Wright

FORCM (FMF) Ronney Wright, Navy Reserve Force, praised the work of Reserve Component personnel and their outstanding performance in Operations Iraqi and Enduring Freedom. Readiness and mission focus are key to force relevance, and the Navy Reserve is restructuring itself to most effectively execute our nation's War on Terror. Many active duty Sailors are transitioning to the Reserves, which allows the Navy to maintain valuable skills. Wright urged shipmates to assist Reservist who may need help, particularly those who are Individual Augmentees (IAs), by guiding them to Military OneSource or the Navy Safe Harbor program.



#### **MCPO Cowan**

MCPO Thomas Cowan, USCG Reserve Command Master Chief for Maintenance Logistic Command Pacific, spoke about the wide array of skills that Reserve personnel bring to the Coast Guard's total force and the value of their military experience in the civilian workplace. Cowan also thanked FRA for its work to improve the quality of life for all military personnel and their families, particularly the new GI Bill and other legislation that positively impacts the Reserve community.











#### **FORCM Penton**

FORCM (SW/AW) Chris Penton, Force Master Chief for Navy Recruiting Command, spoke about Navy Recruiting Command's mission to motivate, man, train and equip the recruiting force. He outlined the command structure and praised recruiters for their important and successful efforts to fill Navy billets without lowering standards. Approximately 72 percent of America's youth are not qualified to join the Navy and the war in Iraq and Afghanistan also presents a challenge for recruiters. Penton acknowledged a reduction in "influencers" who might encourage their sons and daughters to join the military, and reminded shipmates that they, too, are recruiters.

claims for benefits. Efforts to diagnose and treat Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), and provide seamless transition from DoD to the VA healthcare system were also discussed. Secor also highlighted the VA's recent determination that amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a degenerative nerve disease, is now considered a presumptively compensable illness for all veterans with 90 days or more of continuously active service in the military. of numerous FRA delegates during the course of convention week. In addition to collecting veterans' recollections, the VHP also invites those who supported war efforts in a civilian capacity to share their stories as well. The interviews are recorded and/or videotaped, and many VHP offices offer veterans the opportunity to purchase a CD of their interview for a nominal charge. "Every veteran has a unique perspective on their wartime service," explained Erickson, "and it's important to preserve their memories."

#### **IMIS AND BRANCH ADMIN BASICS**

Managing shipmate and branch membership data was the focus of a workshop presented by Eileen Murphy, FRA's Director of Marketing and Communications. She demonstrated the process of logging into FRA's website (www.fra.org) to update personal information, and also explained how branch secretaries and regional officers can review branch rosters, download membership reports, request recruiting materials and perform other basic administrative functions. The workshop also provided an opportunity for shipmates to ask specific questions about their personal and/or branch administrative requirements.

#### **VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT**

Dick Erickson facilitated a workshop on the Library of Congress' efforts to preserve oral histories of warera veterans through the Veterans History Project (VHP). Erickson, chairman of the Branson Veterans History Project (VHP) for the Branson Veterans Task Force, also interviewed and recorded the stories

Ken Ductor, Veteran and Charitable Organization Director for the Marine Corps' Wounded Warrior Regiment (WWR), provided an overview of the regiment's mission. Ductor invited shipmates to join the WWR team by offering their time and energy to WWR initiatives in their areas that assist these American heroes.

#### **SPECIFICATIONS**

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THE USS WAYNE E. Meyer (DDG-108) was christened on 18 October 2008, making it the Navy's newest Arleigh-Burke class destroyer. The 509.5-foot ship was named after the man who is known as the Father of Aegis, a highly advanced integrated combat system that is used on all Arleigh-Burke class destroyers and Ticonderoga class cruisers. Admiral and Mrs. Meyer were on-hand for the christening in Bath, Maine.

Destroyers are often called the "Greyhounds of the Sea" for their speed and maneuverability, as well as their endurance capabilities. They are multi-mission warships with both offensive and defensive capability and can work independently or as escorts for larger vessels in a fleet, convoy or battle group. Destroyers

are also affectionately called "tin cans," referring to the early days when the vessels had little protective armor and relied solely on their speed and maneuverability.

From the first U.S. destroyer commissioned in 1902 to the famous ships of World War II to the Spruance-class to today's Arleigh Burke-class, the U.S. Navy's destroyers continue to evolve. The Aegis Combat System (ACS) is an advanced command and control and weapon control system that uses powerful computers and radars to track and destroy enemy targets. It is the world's most advanced naval surface ship combat system and the first fully integrated combat system built to defend against air, surface, and subsurface threats.

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

In closing, I am proud and pleased to have represented New England this past year as your Regional President.




